DUAL EXHIBITION AT CREATIVE ARTS WORKSHOP

New Haven, CT – Creative Arts Workshop presents two whimsical exhibitions: a youthful *Adventures in Art* installation by artists in our children's summer programs and interactive *Welcome to Whackville* by Eric Epstein. The shows run from August 6 through September 2 in the Hilles Gallery and open with an ice cream social on Saturday, August 6 from 2-4pm. The exhibitions are free and visitors are welcome Monday-Friday from 9am to 7pm at 80 Audubon Street in New Haven.

CAW's Young People's Department, led by Department Head Nellie Shevelkina, has enlisted local artist Liz Antle to collaborate with students aged 4-17 from the *Adventures in Art* weeklong summer programs. Their installation includes trees, murals, paintings, jewelry, pottery, and photography; and depicts a home for a giant dragonfly sculpture named "Delilah." She was designed during the first International Festival of Arts and Ideas 20 years ago and has lived at the Workshop ever since.

Eric Epstein's *Welcome to Whackville* will add a participatory element to this installation with his interactive percussion piece originally designed for Westville's annual ArtWalk.
